Analysis:

- 76.8% of residents in Carmarthenshire say they are in Good or Very Good health, despite a slight increase from the 2011 census (75.3%), this continues to be less than in Wales (78.6%) and in England and Wales (82%).
- The percentage of residents in very bad health has reduced in Carmarthenshire from 2.2% to 1.9%, this is a slightly higher reduction than in other regions, but Carmarthenshire continues to have the highest proportion of residents in very bad health.
- Over 20,000 (11.4%) of Carmarthenshire residents provide weekly unpaid care, almost 7,400 (36%) of these carers provide 50 or more hours a week of unpaid care. Despite a reduction from the previous census (13.1%), this continues to be a higher proportion of residents compared with Wales (10.5%) and England & Wales (8.8%)

Analysis:

- The percentage of residents that have a limiting disability has reduced slightly in Carmarthenshire and nationally. 11.3% of these are limited a lot to achieve their day to day activities.
- Carmarthenshire has the highest proportion of households that have 2 or more people disabled under the Equality Act with 9.4% compared to 8.4% in Wales and 6.7% in England and Wales.

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Definition:

General Health

General health is a self-assessment of a person's general state of health. People were asked to assess whether their health was very good, good, fair, bad or very bad. This assessment is not based on a person's health over any specified period of time.

Provision of Unpaid Care

A person is a provider of unpaid care if they look after or give support to family members, friends, neighbours or others because of long-term physical or mental ill health or disability, or problems relating to old age. This does not include any activities as part of unpaid employment. No distinction is made about whether any care that a person provides is within their own household or outside of the household, so no explicit link can be made about whether the care provided is for a person within the household who has poor general health or a long-term health problem or disability.

<u>Disabled</u>

People who assessed their day-to-day activities as limited by long-term physical or mental health conditions or illnesses are considered disabled. This definition of a disabled person meets the harmonised standard for measuring disability and is in line with the Equality Act (2010).

Number of disabled people in household

The number of people in a household who assessed their day-to-day activities as limited by long-term physical or mental health conditions or illnesses and are considered disabled. This definition of a disabled person meets the harmonised standard for measuring disability and is in line with the Equality Act (2010).

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
