Swansea Bay City Deal update

A JOINT Committee Agreement (JCA) that outlines principles of Swansea Bay City Deal working will be considered for approval by all four regional councils by the end of July.

If approved, the JCA will pave the way for the City Deal's governance to be formally established.

The governance will include a Joint Committee overseeing all aspects of the City Deal, as well as an Economic Strategy Board (ESB) with representation from the private sector.



Ed Tomp, Vice President and General Manager of Valero UK in Pembroke, has already been chosen as preferred candidate to become chairman of the ESB.

The ESB will engage businesses and the private sector, advise on strategic direction and project delivery, and make recommendations to the City Deal's Joint Committee on opportunities to further strengthen the City Deal's impact.

A Swansea Bay City Deal spokesperson said: "The JCA a vitally important document for the Swansea Bay City Deal.

"A huge amount of work has been taking place behind the scenes to reach a stage where the JCA is ready to go to all four regional councils for approval, so we hope we'll soon be in a position where the City Deal's governance can be officially established.

"Once that happens, we can start drawing down money from both governments, subject to business case approvals, for all 11 City Deal projects, which have the power to transform economic prosperity and improve people's lives throughout Carmarthenshire, Swansea, Neath Port Talbot and Pembrokeshire."

The Swansea Bay City Deal is a £1.3bn investment across the Swansea Bay City Region, which is being funded, subject to the approval of business cases, by the UK Government, the Welsh Government, the public sector and the private sector. Over the next 15 years, the City Deal will boost the regional economy by £1.8bn and generate almost 10,000 new, high-quality jobs.

The City Deal is being led by the four regional local authorities - Carmarthenshire Council, Swansea Council, Neath Port Talbot Council and Pembrokeshire Council - together with the Abertawe Bro Morgannwg and Hywel Dda University Health Boards, Swansea University, the University of Wales Trinity Saint David, and private sector partners.

Eight of the 11 project business cases are now with both governments for assessment. Projects include Yr Egin - a creative digital cluster at the University of Wales Trinity Saint David's campus in Carmarthen; a Wellness and Life Science Village at Delta Lakes in Llanelli; and the Swansea City and Waterfront Digital District that will feature a digital indoor arena and a digital village for tech businesses.

World class digital infrastructure will be introduced to support all City Deal projects, and a Skills and Talent Initiative will be put in place across the City Region to give local people a pathway to access the high-quality jobs that will be created in sectors including life sciences, energy, smart manufacturing and the creative industries.

Peter Austin has also now joined the City Deal's Regional Office from Ceredigion County Council as the City Deal's Business Engagement Manager. Peter's appointment follows Greg Jones, who joined the Regional Office as the City Deal's Communications and Marketing Officer in February.

ESF & Employability: Working Together for Cohesive Regional Delivery



In May the Swansea Bay Regional Engagement Team in collaboration with WCVA's Active Inclusion Team and 3-SET, hosted an 'ESF & Employability: Working Together for Cohesive Regional Delivery' event at Llandybie Memorial Hall. Attended by over 70 delegates the event was an excellent opportunity for all present to find out more about how ESF is supporting employability delivery in South West Wales.

To start the day, representatives from ESF funded Employability and Active Inclusion projects gave an overview of their project's delivery. This set the scene for lively discussion during the networking break where the projects had the opportunity to share experiences and explore joint working.

Presentations from Welsh Government's Employability and Skills department, Active Inclusion, and the Regional Skills and Learning Partnership ensured that by the end of the event the attendees had heard all about the wide range of support available in the region.



The Xcel Project - Community Strikes Lucky with Community Run Bowling Alley



Social Business Wales is funded by the European Regional Development Fund and Welsh Government. It is delivered by the Wales Co-operative Centre and is part of the Business Wales service. Social Business Wales aims to support social businesses with aspirations to grow. The Xcel project is one example of a project that has received assistance from Social Business Wales.

The Xcel Project is a social enterprise founded by Towy Community Church bringing investment, jobs and services to its local community in Carmarthen, Wales. The project aims to support local people in crisis by providing food, furniture and clothing through Carmarthen Foodbank, Xcel Furniture Recycling and Xcel Community Shop.

Paul is the Centre Manger for the Xcel project and this is his story:

I'm a member of the Towy Community church in Carmarthen and my social business journey started when Mark Bennett, our Minister, put forward this idea of us running a bowling centre. Now a church running a bowling centre sounded like a crazy idea but when our Minister explained the goals of the project and the difference this business could make, I was excited and knew it would change lives.

I have a background in video work, so when we first applied for funding, I offered to put together the promo video of what the bowling centre project would look like. That was my initial involvement and when I got to know more about the detail of how the project would work, I offered my services in how to help develop those ideas.

At the time, I'd been self-employed for ten years doing video work and event management for different organisations. Working for myself, gave me flexibility to volunteer and I did this for the first 18 months of the project. For example, one of the first things I did was going out into the local community and finding out if there was a need and want for a bowling alley in the area.

It was project our funders, Big Lottery, that recommended I was employed on a full-time basis. It gave them confidence in their investment because they were working with someone they could trust, who had detailed knowledge and understanding of all areas of the business.
